As I understand the husband of this widow, was on the pension rolls and drawing a pension until his death and of course, if the husband's pension was not illegal, it seems to me that Mrs. Crawford would be entitled, as the widow of her husband, would succeed to the right of a pensioner as his surviving widow. On examining the Pension law, don't know that a Confederate widow must come under a property qualification exemption.

Commissioner Hogg is at the present time ill and at his home in Shawnee, but I am sure he will be only too glad to take this matter under consideration, and in the meantime I would advise that you have two disinterested men who are acquainted with real estate values in the vicinity in which Mrs. Crawford lives, investigate and appraise her land and advise us as to their findings. Dear Sirs:

I have your letter of 20th inst. asking what part of the \$2000 loan has been paid. No part of same has been paid except the annual interest. My annual income some years is very small, while others it is more. All the income I have is the rents off the 160 acres of land I own. After paying taxes, insurance and interest on the said loan and for the upkeep of the place it will not amount to \$500 per year. I get one-fourth of all cotton raised on the land and one-third of all feed crops raised on the land, and there is no way of determining what my annual income will be except to figure it upon an average of the past four or five years. The taxes amount to more than \$100, the interest \$100, insurance is about \$25.00 per year. The total rents received last year was about \$400 and the year before less than that and for the year 1920 it only produced about \$80.00 rents. This year it will pay a little more than \$500 but I have to pay funeral expenses, taxes, interest and expenses of last sickness of my husband J.M. Crawford. After paying debts owing by the estate of my husband I will not have anything left. I own the land by virtue of the will of my husband, which directs the payment of all his just debts, which will take all of the income from the place, leaving really no income this year for my individual use.

I shall be glad to give you any further information you may desire if you will kindly let me know.

Dear Mrs. Crawford:

The Commissioner directs me to advise that he will not be able to grant you a pension unless some different explanation of your property is given him.

At the time that your husband applied for a pension he stated that he possessed, nor did his wife possess, nor did any one hold in trust for his use and benefit or for his wife's use and benefit any property, either real or personal, and that he had no annual income from any source that amounted to the sum of \$180.00 - the amount at that date prescribed by law. I am inclosing a copy of our claim blanks, with one sentence underscored showing you that every time he signed a claim for pension warrant he stated that the same conditions were existing that did exist at the time he made application, so far as property was concerned. Of course we did not know that he had this one hundred sixty acre farm.

If your farm is worth \$3500.00 over and above encumbrances, you are ineligible to a pension since you could not be considered indigent.
